











45. The seal used by John, between March 1185 and as late as October 1199. In 1185 John adopted this seal and enabled John for the first time to present himself as a magnate in his own right. On the front, John is shown as a fully armed knight carrying a shield charged with two lions passant. The legend around the edge of the seal reads SIGILLUM JOHANNIS FILII REGIS ANGLIE DOMINI HIB'NIE (the seal of John, son of the King of England, Lord of Ireland).


